This is a summary of how our school delivers music education to all our pupils across three areas – curriculum music, co-curricular provision and musical experiences – and what changes we are planning in future years. This information is to help pupils and parents or carers understand what our school offers and who we work with to support our pupils' music education.

## Part A: Curriculum music

This is about what we teach in lesson time, how much time is spent teaching music and any music qualifications or awards that pupils can achieve.

	Charanga (our scheme of work) provides a clear lesson structure where children have the opportunity to sing/use instruments according to the activity. ## Part B: Co-curricular music

This is about opportunities for pupils to sing and play music, outside of lesson time, including choirs, ensembles and bands, and how pupils can make progress in music beyond the core curriculum.

<b>Access to lessons across a range of instruments and voice (outside curriculum music)</b>	Currently offer: - woodwind instruments - brass instruments - violin/ viola - keyboard - guitar At year beginning, invite peripatetic teachers to deliver an assembly on their instruments to encourage children to sign up.	Provide more opportunities for these children to perform for the rest of the school.	Organise two music ensembles throughout the year, to give children the opportunity to perform to others. This could be one in Spring term performed to the school, and one in Summer term performed to parents/ carers. Invite children to play in assemblies to raise the profile of playing a musical instrument. During whole school assemblies, HW to continue the musical focus which began last year (composers/ role of the conductor/ film music/ orchestral instruments etc)	End of Spring 2026, end of Summer 2026  July 2026  July 2026
<b>A school choir and/ or vocal ensemble</b>	School choir who rehearse on a Tuesday lunchtime (currently 60 members). School choir is a free club for <b>all</b> who would like to attend. The choir have a range of events they can perform at, such as local events (Ruislip Fun Day/ Poplars Care Home) and Young Voices at Wembley Arena.	To encourage some Year 6 children to join the choir so the choir is representative of a range of year groups.	LM to continue to raise the profile of the choir, where possible, include choir performances as part of assemblies to give children performance opportunities.  Continue to provide opportunities throughout the year for the choir to perform outside school/ part of larger events	Ongoing  Ongoing

<b>A school ensemble/ band/ group</b>	School orchestra – runs in spring and summer term, once children who are new to peripatetic lessons have learnt a couple of notes. Numbers vary between 10 and 20, depending on number of musicians. Club runs after school on a Thursday and is free to all who wish to attend. Performance shared with the school and parents/carers at the Summer term music ensemble.	Continue to encourage more children to start learning a musical instrument (through assemblies etc)	Continue to ask peripatetic teachers to deliver assemblies on different musical instrument families so that children make an informed decision about which instrument they would like to learn.  HW to also raise profile of music through assemblies (composers, listening to music, inviting chn to perform) etc If enough musicians, orchestra will resume in January 2025.	By December 2025  By July 2026  By July 2026
<b>Space for rehearsals and individual practice</b>	Woodwind, brass, string, guitar and keyboard lessons on a weekly basis (in the music room). Music room is used for choir rehearsals; orchestra rehearsals take place in the hall. Prefects ensure music room is tidy and ready for use.	Prefects to continue looking after music room. We are unable to provide the room for individuals/ groups to use without an adult, as we are not able to staff the supervision of this.	Regular contact with music prefects. Regular contact with music teachers who use the room. HW to ensure teachers (where possible) use music room for teaching	HW to follow up Spring 2026

## Part C: Musical experiences

This is about all the other musical events and opportunities that we organise, such as singing in assembly, concerts and shows, and trips to professional concerts.

<b>A termly school performance</b>	The choir perform at least once a term to the school in assembly and at an event. <b>Autumn</b> – Christmas performances by all year groups, carol concert at St Martins' Church, assembly from peri. teachers (where possible), Year 5 Harvest performance, pantomime performed by external theatre company for whole school <b>Spring</b> – organise music ensemble to school (choir to Young Voices, so choir can share their performance) <b>Summer</b> – Year 4 performance, Year 6 leavers' performance, music ensemble to parents/ carers	Children regularly hear performances from choir. This could be developed into hearing more from soloists (at the beginning/ end of an assembly). This could be children or adults who play a musical instrument and would be willing to share with children.	HW to communicate with parents to ask whether any would be willing to play a piece of music for children (at the beginning/ end of an assembly)  HW to organise children to play in assemblies throughout the year.  Look into possibilities of an orchestra/ chamber group performing for children.	By end of Summer 2026, there will have been at least one performance each term, with smaller performances by soloists.

<b>Opportunity to enjoy live performance at least once a year</b>	Children do have the opportunity to enjoy a live performance – the Christmas panto/ music ensembles, but more could be done to expose them to a live group of instrumentalists (orchestra/ jazz group etc) We use digital recordings of group performances to enhance music assemblies, but it would be more beneficial for the children to witness a performance live. More research to be done into other opportunities, such as seeing an orchestra.	Look into more opportunities for professional musicians/ groups to perform for children to give them an experience of live music.	HW to research groups who could come into school and offer a 'performance'.	By end of Summer 2026.
